1. The college management has established a student welfare committee dedicated to identifying and supporting underprivileged and deserving students. Financial aid is provided through direct support (PTA), payment of tuition fees, and coverage of examination fees for students who demonstrate financial need. Notices and outreach within classrooms ensure students are informed about available assistance and guided through the application process for scholarships.

The college facilitates applications for central programs such as the National Means-cum-Merit Scholarship (NMMS), which provides substantial financial support to students from economically weaker sections.Post-Matric Scholarships and merit-based schemes such as the PM Young Achievers Scholarship Award Scheme (PM-YASASVI) support eligible students to pursue their education. State government scholarships and schemes cover tuition fees, educational materials, and other related expenses, making education more accessible to marginalized groups

These initiatives offer students the opportunity to focus on academic excellence and personal development, reducing dropout rates and promoting social mobility. The financial support motivates students to participate in academic, sports, and extracurricular activities, contributing to all-round development

Overall, by combining its own resources with government-sponsored scholarship schemes, the college is able to effectively encourage and uplift financially weaker students, ensuring equal access to quality education in line with its mission of inclusivity and support.

2. With the increased environmental degradation, there is alarming need to initiate the activities and green initiative to safeguard our ecology. Therefore, at college level only, students should be encouraged and made aware of eco-friendly activities. Keeping in view college administration organized various activities with the help of NCC, NSS, Rover and Rangers, Road Safety Clubs, Management Clubs, Eco Club etc.

3.Tree plantation drives and "Vanmahatsav" and "Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam" celebrations encouraged students to plant and nurture trees on campus and in the community. Environmental awareness rallies, placard campaigns, and cleanliness drives promoted eco-friendly habits, reduction of plastic use, and responsible waste management. Special events such as World Environment Day, quiz competitions, model exhibitions, and expert talks deepened understanding of conservation, sustainability, and the importance of innovations in environmental protection.

Volunteers from NCC, NSS, Ranger/Rovers, and other clubs participated with enthusiasm, demonstrating leadership and teamwork during these campaigns. These activities helped create a direct connection between students and the environment, motivating them to adopt eco-conscious habits and inspiring a sense of responsibility as future caretakers of the planet.

Such sustained efforts in 2024-25 by college units and clubs have contributed to greater environmental awareness and meaningful climate action among the student community.

Best Practice I:

Title: Financial Assistance for needy students through active facilitation of Government Scholarship Schemes (Central as well as State) and College PTA Fund.

Context:

The college actively facilitates students' applications for eligible central and state scholarship schemes each year, enabling many to benefit. This provides aid to economically disadvantaged and meritorious students promoting sustained educational participation at higher level. Moreover, complementing these schemes, college administration allocates financial assistance from the PTA fund, offering support for students who may not qualify for external scholarships and are facing challenges in completing higher education. These efforts aim to support and uplift students from weaker socioeconomic backgrounds.

Government Scholarship Schemes: In the academic year, 2024-25, majority of students across various courses and curriculum have become well-informed about various centrally and state-sponsored scholarship schemes. College administration ensures all the support needed by the freshly enrolled students by guiding them and providing them information and knowledge regarding these schemes. These initiatives benefit many students including those belonging to SC, ST, OBC, EBC, general or minority communities, and BPL families as well as the students with disabilities. Additionally, many students are made aware of merit-based scholarship opportunities. 


